FLVS Courses Will Still Be Debited

From McKay Scholarships

May 9, 2014 Update

Despite assurances by legislators that the deductions from McKay Scholarships for completed FLVS courses would be fixed this session, this did not happen. As of Tuesday, April 29th, we were told it was in the conforming bill and should pass. Unfortunately, it was not placed in the conforming bill and was not changed before the session ended.

This means that parents of any McKay Scholarship recipient who takes an FLVS course (summer classes included) will see a deduction in their scholarship payment. For a two semester course the deduction will be approximately \$770.

It is important that schools make parents aware of this issue.

The Coalition will reach out to FLVS and ask that they post this information on their website since, for McKay parents, FLVS courses are not truly free.

We will work on trying to have the exemption language passed again next year. Next fall, we will call for parents and schools to contact their legislators to ask them to pass this legislation.

We want to thank Rep. Bileca for all of his efforts for our parents and students concerning this issue.

Two Other Issues Concerning Virtual Courses

1) McKay Scholarship recipients may only take two FLVS courses in a year without forfeiting their scholarship. Make sure that your parents understand that if their child is enrolled in two courses during the school year, the student cannot take another course in the summer.

No course number limit exists for enrolling in other virtual school programs. Students may enroll in more than two virtual courses if they are not through FLVS.

2) McKay Scholarship recipients will LOSE their scholarship if they enroll in a virtual school course that is a district virtual school course. This is considered reenrolling in the public school and eligibility for scholarships is lost upon enrollment.

FCIS Heads' Retreat June 9-11, 2014 Hyatt Regency Coconut Point, Bonita Springs

In June we welcomed 51 Heads of School to the 22nd Annual Heads' Retreat in Bonita Springs. At

the Welcome Reception, two retiring school heads were recognized for their years of service to FCIS: Cathy Hardage, Head of St. Mark's Episcopal School in Jacksonville, and William Jablon, Head of Maclay School in Tallahassee. Cathy was the Head at St. Mark's for 8 years. She served on the FCIS Board and is currently one of the Convention Co-Chairs. Bill was Headmaster at Maclay for 38 years, serving under all four Executive Directors of FCIS. A Board Member for 12 years, Bill also participated in approximately 80 accreditation visits throughout the years! Carol Lee Curtis, retiring Director of Professional Development, was also honored for her fifteen years of exceptional service with FCIS. The following day Dr. Hodges introduced the new Director of Professional Development, Alison Carlson.

At this year's retreat the theme was "Positive Leadership in the 21st Century". Featured speakers were Mr. William T. Krizner, an attorney from Tallahassee, and Professor Richard P. Honack, an Adjunct Professor of Executive Education at the Kellogg School of Management at Northwestern University. In his workshop "The 7 Cornerstones in Creating Cohesive Cultures" Mr. Krizner identified essential traits for a thriving school community and provided practical strategies for cultivating a healthier school culture while also minimizing legal risks. Professor Honack presented his session "Strategic Thinking in the Nanosecond Culture" in which he characterized our fast-paced culture, the evolving values and leadership traits of each generation, and the resulting change in landscape for future workforces. He encouraged Heads to consider in their strategic planning how they and their schools will learn, educate, lead and market in this environment of changing values and new expectations. Heads found the workshops relevant, engaging and thought-provoking and seemed energized by their time spent relaxing and enjoying each other.

New Florida State Certification Requirement


The Department of Education has issued a new rule for ALL those renewing or reinstating a Florida Professional Certificate

Here is an outline of the renewal and reinstatement requirements.

- Anyone renewing a state professional certificate after July 1, 2014, will be required to obtain one college credit or 20 in-service points in the area of teaching students with disabilities (SWD). This will not add to total already required (six semester hours/120 in-service points). Example: 100 master in-service points and 20 SWD master in-service points
- No one is exempt from meeting the requirement. It does not matter what you are certified in, whether or not you are teaching, what subject you are teaching, or what your degree major is in.
- A National Board certificate in Exceptional Needs Specialist Early Childhood through Young Adult can be used to satisfy the requirement.
- A passing score on the Florida Subject Area Exam in Exceptional Student Education, Hearing Impairment, Visually Impaired, or Speech-Language Impaired can be used provided it was taken during the validity period of the professional certificate being renewed.
- If your certificate expires on June 30, 2014, or June 30, 2105, you will NOT need to meet the new requirement during this renewal period **provided** the renewal application and fee are **submitted** by **June 30, 2014**, and provided you have met renewal requirements by June 30, 2014. You can not submit your application and fee to renew unless all points are posted or you have your official transcript showing the completed college credit.
