#### Convention 2014 \* November 20-21, 2014 \* Jacksonville

Thank you to all the schools, speakers and sponsors who participated in the annual FCIS Convention at the Hyatt Regency Jacksonville Riverfront in November. Convention Committee Chairs, Palmer Bell, Head of Riverside Presbyterian Day School; Martha Milton, Head of Beaches Episcopal School; and Cathy Hardage, Retired Head of St. Mark's Episcopal Day School designed a program that highlighted transformative ways to expand learning environments and shift educational mindsets. In order to prepare for the challenges of globalization and technological advancements, students must develop the skills, habits of mind, and knowledge to problem solve in real world situations and the cultural competence to serve as citizens and leaders in a global community.

ISM kicked off the Convention with a pre-conference workshop, *Schools That Win*. Nearly 40 participants spent the day thinking about the future of their schools in four different areas: leadership, enrollment, development, and money. Simon Jeynes presented current research and framed the important questions to ask to ensure that their schools sustain strong numbers in both enrollment and finances. Participants designed strategic plans in each of the four areas to bring back to their respective schools and help drive effectiveness.

Nearly 1700 educators from 130 FCIS schools attended two energizing days filled with innovative sessions on topics targeting educational leadership, character development, student engagement, creativity through divergent thinking, and the use of evolving technologies to enhance teaching and learning. Outstanding keynote addresses were delivered by Dr. Yong Zhao, Presidential Chair and Director of the Institute of Global and Online Education in the College of Education, University of Oregon, and John Hunter, Filmmaker, Author, and Inventor of the *World Peace Game*. To meet the challenges of globalization and technological advancements, we need creative and entrepreneurial citizens who are capable of creating new jobs and opportunities for themselves and others around the globe. Cultivating globally competent, creative and entrepreneurial citizens requires a new educational paradigm, and in his presentation Dr. Yong Zhao outlined the essential elements. In his keynote, John Hunter explained how the *World Peace Game* reinforces the idea that today's students are tomorrow's leaders and that giving students practice in complex problem solving and complicated communication issues is good practice for their challenges and opportunities as adults.

Both the luncheons sold out in anticipation of our two luncheon keynotes: Donna Orem, Chief Operating Officer, National Association of Independent Schools, and Grant Lichtman, Senior Fellow of The Martin Institute for Teaching Excellence, Author, Consultant, Speaker. On Thursday, more than 350 administrators attended the luncheon to hear Donna Orem's presentation. She spoke about the current educational land-scape characterized by change and emphasized the importance of understanding how to use disruptive challenges to drive positive change. More than 800 faculty members attended the Friday luncheon and heard a presentation by Grant Lichtman. He highlighted the importance of restructuring the learning relationship between students, teachers and knowledge in order to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing world. He also outlined the programmatic and pedagogical changes needed in education in order to prepare students for an unknowable future and described the ways successful schools are making these changes. During the luncheon, door prizes were also awarded, and the lucky winners went home with a number of great prizes: gift baskets, gift cards, and overnight stays at the Mission Inn Resort, Sanibel Harbour Marriott Resort, Hyatt Regency Riverfront Jacksonville, and St. Augustine Courtyard Marriott.

Dr. Barbara Hodges also delivered a 'state of the association' address on Thursday, bringing members up to date on current FCIS initiatives.

### **About the Keynote—Susan Engel**

SUSAN ENGEL was born in NYC in 1959. She grew up on a farm on the eastern end of Long Island, and attended Sarah Lawrence College. She earned her doctorate in Development Psychology at the CUNY Graduate Center. Though she has been teaching college for over 20 years, she also has taught children aged 3-18, as well as adults. She is Senior Lecturer in Psychology, and Class of 1959 Director of the Program in Teaching at Williams College. Her research has focused on the emergence of narratives, children's autobiographical memory, imaginative processes in childhood, and the development of curiosity. Her work appears in chapters and articles for scientific publications, and she has also written for teachers and parents. She has published four books. Her most recent is *Red Flags or Red Herrings?: Predicating Who Your Child Will Become.* She is the co-founder of an experimental school in New York State, where she oversaw all aspects of educational practice, including developing curriculum and supervising the teachers for 14 years. In 2007/8 she published a series of columns in the New York Times describing how teachers solve problems, and in 2009/10 she published four op-ed pieces in the New York Times. She is also currently serving as director of learning and teaching for a public school district in Western Massachusetts. She lives with her husband Tom Levin, in New Marlborough Massachusetts. They have three sons, Jake, Will and Sam.
