> **CAPE** – The SAT mean scores for 2013 graduates from independent schools exceeded the previously set College and Career Readiness Benchmark of a combined score of 1550. The mean combined score for independent school seniors was 1662, exceeding the benchmark by 112 points, as compared to public school seniors with a mean combined score of 1474, 76 points below the standard. On the 2012-13 SAT National Scores, the mean score for writing was 545 for independent schools, 528 for religious schools, and 480 for public schools. The reading mean score was 536 for independent schools, 531 for religious schools, and 491 for public schools; the math mean score was 581 for independent schools, 536 for religious schools, and 503 for public schools.

#### Florida Kindergarten Council Convention October 12<sup>th</sup>, 2013 *The World is Our Playground*

Early Childhood Education stimulates the development of cognitive, social, and self awareness skills in children so as to furnish society with innovative and productive men and women. This is the consummate ideology that the Florida Kindergarten Council con-

tinues to promulgate during its annual convention.

*The World is Our Playground*, the theme of the Florida Kindergarten Council's 2013 Convention, upheld this conversation among the 55 schools and about 204 attendees.





The meeting of various experienced and eager minds enlivened the sixteen engaging sessions, including The World, Word, and Wisdom; Rockin' to the Core: Meet Your Common Core Standards with Music and Movement Fun; and Beyond the Pretty Costumes: Educating for Global Competence. They all ran the gamut of dovetailing learning with fun inside and outside the classroom, while ensuring that cross-discipline connections, critical thinking, and creativity were quotidian practices.

Our keynote speaker, Dr. Sharon Shaffer, a leading expert in the field of early learning, who works with schools and museums nationally and internationally, declaimed the benefits of Object-based Learning. She emphasized the prodigious influence of introducing objects to students as a basis of "hands-on" learning, where by identifying and describing characteristics, age, origin, use, and purpose to spark expression and critical thinking in students.



These enlightening teaching techniques and strategies from Dr. Shaffer and the dedicated presenters are examples of teachers' continuous efforts to make the learning experience for our young leaders exciting and insightful.
