The Prospective Heads Institute (PHI) talked with heads and administrators around the state, I believe that this year promises to be an outstanding one! All of us at FCIS wish each of you well as you are embarking years. Approximately 20 percent of those participants have upon the 2019-20 school year!

Just as all of you have put significant time into planning for the upcoming school year, FCIS has engaged in similar practices to promote our schools and programs.

- The summer has brought additional time for the planning of the first FCIS Early Childhood Institute, which will be held on February 1, 2020 at The Doubletree SeaWorld Orlando, Orlando.

As you can see, FCIS continues to work diligently to implement the new accreditation process and protocols, as well as to enhance our professional development programs, especially in the area of leadership.

Upcoming Events. FCIS has opened registration for various institutes that are a part of our Dale D. Regan

New Heads' Institute / Finance Institute / Fundraising Institute

July 25-27, 2019

Hyatt Regency Coconut Point, Bonita Springs

This year, 12 new FCIS Heads registered for a three-day institute at the Hyatt Regency Coconut Point in Bonita Springs. New heads participated in workshops on governance, board/head relationships, enrollment management, accreditation, Florida demographics, legal issues, financial sustainability, budgeting, and fundraising. Informal discussions were held during the lunches and dinners.

The final day of the institute was devoted to fundraising, and Heads, Business Officers, and Advancement Officers from FCIS schools joined our new Heads to hear a full day of topics, including: *Governance, Essential Components of Successful Fundraising, Building a Culture of Philanthropy by Engaging Leadership, Giving and Getting, Capital Campaigns, The Art of the Ask, Major Giving, Effective Prospect Research, Minding Your Philanthropic Manners, and Hiring, Attracting and Retaining Development Professionals.*

As a separate opportunity, Heads, Business Officers, Division Heads, and Advancement Officers attended the Finance Institute for a full-day workshop. In the morning, participants got an overview of independent school finance, including budgets, financial aid, and net tuition revenue. Participants also discussed important financial aid metrics that their schools should be tracking and monitoring year by year and how to identify and slow down or turn around negative trends. In the afternoon, participants explored questions school leaders should ask, and the corresponding data each school should have, in relation to the school's financial health, its recent history, and its future projections. Participants discovered techniques used to gather and track data and reviewed sample schedules prepared annually, including financial aid models, cost effectiveness by division, net tuition revenue by grade, dashboards, and benchmarking. Participants received long-range planning tools to assist their schools in obtaining the necessary data to make informed decisions, as well as analyze, project, and present the future impact of those decisions to the leadership of their school.

Based on the positive feedback from these events, participants found the speakers knowledgeable and accessible and their expertise on the wide variety of topics invaluable. Participants also enjoyed networking and sharing experiences with each other and building supportive relationships within this cohort.









Aspiring Administrators' Institute July 28-29, 2019 Hyatt Regency Coconut Point, Bonita Springs

This summer, FCIS launched the *Aspiring Administrators' Institute*, a new professional development opportunity designed to strengthen leadership capacity in our schools by developing, supporting, and mentoring emerging leaders in their personal and professional journey.



In July, 24 FCIS aspiring and new administrators gathered at the Hyatt Regency Coconut Point in Bonita Springs to participate in workshops that focused on developing their own leadership skills and deepening their understanding of leadership in independent schools. On the first day, a panel of experienced FCIS Division Heads, shared their own leadership paths and explored the peaks and valleys of day-to-day life as an administrator. Participants examined and affirmed their own professional talents and interests and developed a vision for their career planning.

On the second day, Barbara Beachley, Director of Advisory Services, Independent School Management (ISM), facilitated a full-day program, *Define Yourself as a Leader and Chart Your Path.* Participants examined management team structure, what it means to be an academic leader, and the responsibilities and challenges of school administrators. Participants also explored their own vision and motivation for becoming leaders, as well as personal strengths, challenges, and work styles. Participants left with an understanding of what leadership is and what to expect as an academic leader, concrete tools for assessing faculty culture, and an action plan charting their path to the next level.



Administrators' Institute July 28-30, 2019 Hyatt Regency Coconut Point, Bonita Springs

At the end of July, FCIS administrators also gathered at the Hyatt Regency Coconut Point in Bonita Springs to participate in relevant and informative workshops, to engage in informal discussion groups, and to network with colleagues from across the state. On the first day, Melissa Alton, FCIS Director of Accreditation, provided an overview of the new self-study process utilizing the FCIS Accreditation Portal, the pre-visit, as well as the "nuts and bolts" of preparing for the evaluating team's arrival.

On the second day, Marin Burton, Ph.D., Senior Faculty of Societal Advancement at the Center for Creative Leadership, presented *Leveraging Polarities: Developing leadership skills for managing everyday tensions*. Marin explored Polarity Thinking and how leaders can use this lens to effectively manage individual, team or organizational challenges. Participants engaged with a mapping tool that helps identify the upsides and downsides of each pole in order to see the entire polarity to be managed. Participants left with an increased understanding of polarities and tensions that exist within leadership roles, more developed self-awareness about relevant polarities and preferences about core leadership tasks, and an understanding of polarity mapping as a tool to develop action plans for increasing leadership effectiveness. Later that day, participants who had ever considered becoming a Head were encouraged to attend a Q&A session with our Executive Director, Dr. Barbara Hodges.

On the last day, Barbara Beachley, Director of Advisory Services at Independent School Management (ISM), presented *Support Student Success with Faculty Growth and Evaluation Framework*. Barbara introduced a ground-breaking growth and evaluation framework for faculty. Participants examined ISM's most recent research on what independent school faculty look for in a work environment and what students look for, as well as the critical relationships between leadership, growth and evaluation, faculty culture, and student performance. Participants learned how to use growth and evaluation frameworks for Heads, administrators, and non-teaching staff that round out the process to ensure a growth-focused and mission-aligned culture across all areas of the school. Participants left with the purpose and desired outcomes of faculty growth and evaluation; the biggest mistakes schools make in approaching growth and evaluation; tools to assess and strengthen faculty culture and the student experience; and tools for evaluating Heads, administrators, and non-teaching staff.

Participants of both Institutes took full advantage of connecting with educators from peer schools and enjoyed learning from each other and building the foundation for professional learning networks for ongoing collegial support.
