from the executive director...

As many of you are reading this newsletter, another school year is coming to an end. I hope that you are making plans for some much needed rest and relaxation sometime during the summer months. This school year brought many opportunities and many challenges. Soon after we had all just settled into the 2018-19 school year, our state encountered another major hurricane, Michael, the first Category 5 hurricane to strike the United States since 1992. This time, considerable damage was done to the Florida Panhandle. Two of our schools sustained significant damage from the hurricane, but neither school was deterred by that damage, and our member schools were there to support them and help pick them up. In both cases, these schools were the first schools to reopen in their counties, despite all of the hardships that the faculty, staff, students, and families had endured. One is back on its original site, and the other is meeting on two temporary campuses, one made of portables. I am moved by the resilience of our schools that were damaged and by the generous hearts of FCIS schools from around the state. It truly exemplifies the meaning of the "FCIS family". All of our schools have had their own chalstate, I continue to marvel at the quality educational experiences that are being provided by our FCIS schools; our schools are truly "leading in excellence".

New Opportunities. FCIS continues to add new resources to support our member schools. Below are the highlights of those resources.

- This was the first full year of implementation of the accreditation portal, which debuted in January 2018. A new enhancement of the portal this year was the addition of a feature that allows schools to upload their documentation directly into the portal to coincide with standards and indicators.
- The FCIS Director and Assistant Director of Accreditation continued to move around the state to offer evaluation and portal training.
- The FCIS Director of Accreditation developed training materials to help schools better understand the function of "Essential Questions".
- FCIS expanded its governance training to include the "Partnership of 3", which focused on the team of the head of school, board chair, and chief financial of-
- FCIS expanded The Leadership Academy to include a new Aspiring Administrators' Institute, which will debut in August.
- Under the leadership of the FCIS Director of Professional Development, FCIS formed a collaborative

partnership with The Klingenstein Center at Teachers College Columbia University to provide quality professional development for admiistrators and teachers.

2019 Florida Legislative Session. The 2019 Florida Legislative Session convened on March 5 and concluded on May 4. The most impactful educational changes were found in SB 7070, which included the Family Empowerment Scholarship; the bill was quickly signed into law by the Governor. This new statute provides additional funding for scholarships begun as Florida Tax Credit Scholarships (FTCS). Unlike the FTCS, these new scholarships will be funded by the state in a similar manner as the McKay Scholarship. Families may still go to the websites of the Scholarship Funding Organizations (SFOs), such as StepUp and AAA, and there should be a link to the FLDOE. More information on the results of the 2019 Legislative Session may be found on the FCIS website.

ICAISA. The International Council Advancing Indelenges and their own opportunities. As I travel around the pendent School Accreditation, made up of 20 independent school associations from around the world, has just named its founding executive director. Bonnie Ricci, formerly head of school at The Birches School in Massachusetts and the previous Director of Accreditation of the Association of Independent Schools of the Northeast (AISNE), will begin her new role on July 1, 2019. I was elected to the position of chair of the ICAISA Board of Directors in February, and I look forward to the work of promoting the value and quality of independent school accreditation around the world.

> FCIS Convention. It is not too early to make plans to attend the 2019 FCIS Annual Convention at the Hyatt Regency Orlando International Airport on November 7-8, 2019. Convention information can be found on the FCIS website.

> In Closing. As the new school year dawns on July 1, 2019, FCIS will continue to focus on offering professional development opportunities to meet the needs of our schools, will continue to refine our relatively new accreditation process and resources, and will continue to advocate for the independence of our schools through lobbying efforts with the Florida Legislature and the Florida High School Athletic Association (FHSAA).

FCIS Business Officers' Conference

May 5-7, 2019 Renaissance Airport Hotel, Orlando

FCIS welcomed over 60 participants to Orlando for the third Annual FCIS Business Officers' Conference. Business Officers, Heads, and other school leaders attended the almost two-day event. This was the 33rd conference for Florida independent school business officers, formerly known as FISBO.

On Monday morning, Jeff Shields, President and CEO of the National Business Officers' Association (NBOA), gave the opening keynote presentation, *Perspectives and Insights for Navigating Financial Trends*. Participants explored the top trends facing independent school business officers and discussed strategies for addressing them and leading a school to future financial success. Additional topics covered throughout the conference included: risk management, employment law issues, catastrophic property insurance, school sustainability, fringe benefits, financial aid and net tuition revenue, high-level customer service, auxiliary programs, and 21st century trends in independent schools. On Monday afternoon, Dr. Barbara Hodges presented *The Business Officer's Role in Leading and Maintaining Accreditation*. She discussed the value of accreditation to an independent school, the role of accreditation in long term school sustainability, and the extent to which the chief business officer should lead and maintain accreditation. Participants learned the importance of accreditation as a facilitator of best practices in promoting the health and sustainability of an independent school.

On Tuesday morning, Tim Fish, Chief Innovation Officer at the National Association of Independent Schools, gave the closing keynote, *Re-imagining Independent Schools: An Innovator's Journey*. Participants took a close look at what needs to be in place for whole school innovation to succeed and learned new capabilities to help build a future-wise school.

Throughout the conference, participants networked with colleagues at peer schools and continued discussions in classroom settings and informal conversations during meals.

FCIS Heads' Retreat June 10-12, 2019

In June, we welcomed 44 Heads of School to the 26th Annual Heads' Retreat on Singer Island.

On the first day, Harry Kraemer, Professor at Northwest University's Kellogg School of Management, kicked off the program. In his session, Becoming a Values-based Leader, Harry highlighted the importance of Four Key Principles (self-reflection, balance, true self-confidence, and genuine humility) in the actions and decisions Heads make as a leader of their school.

The next day, Ian Symmonds, President and Chief Strategist of Ian Symmonds & Associates, presented Leadership in the New Normal. In this session, Ian identified the skills, attributes, and dispositions that leaders need in the brave, new normal of independent schools. Participants discussed how to best lead their organizations, as the industry moves through a pivotal inflection point, a shifting business model, changing modes of delivery, and a redefined role of education in the world. Heads found the workshops relevant, engaging, and thought provoking.

Heads were energized by their time spent delving into the type of leadership needed in today's economic and po-

litical environment and in a rapidly changing world and by networking with each other. On Tuesday, spouses were invited to a poolside chat to share conversation and enjoy the beautiful resort facilities. On Tuesday evening, there was a great turnout at the family barbecue, and with a number of kids in attendance, the atmosphere was fun and lively.

Summer Symposiums June 19-20, 2019 Corbett Preparatory School of IDS, Tampa

At the end of June, FCIS held the *Summer Symposiums*, an exciting collaboration with The Klingenstein Center at Teachers College, Columbia University. Administrators and teachers from across the state signed up to attend either one or two full-day FCIS workshops at Corbett Preparatory School of IDS in Tampa. The first day was designed for administrators and teachers to explore the principles of data-driven leadership and experience a hands-on simulation of a data-driven inquiry process in structured leadership teams. The second day was designed to illuminate key discoveries and practical teaching strategies from the science of learning.

Full of Data, Yet Starving for Information: An Introduction to Data-Driven School Leadership

On the first day, Kenny Graves, Ph.D., Upper School Ethics & Technology Coordinator at Ethical Culture Fieldston School, explored the underlying principles of data-driven leadership; how school teams use data-driven

leadership and evidence-based decision making in their work; what constitutes as "good data," and how to prepare and analyze the data to answer learner-centered questions that address problems of practice; and what the ethical responsibilities are to protect student data in the digital age. Participants learned to improve their data literacy; generate measurable, learner-centered questions about problems of practice; recognize, analyze, and interpret "good data"; and understand emergent ethical issues pertaining to the data collected in schools.



Powerful Teaching: Unleash the Science of Learning



On the second day, cognitive scientist, Founder of RetrievalPractice.org & Former K-12 Teacher, Pooja K. Agarwal, Ph.D., illuminated key discoveries and practical teaching strategies from the science of learning, while challenging ingrained beliefs about how learning works. Participants went behind the scenes and explored key findings from cognitive science research; thought critically about current teaching practices from a research-based perspective; challenged myths and misconceptions about how humans learn; and discovered practical classroom strategies for building a supportive classroom culture.

These programs were interactive and collaborative, and participants enjoyed diving deeply into each topic and connecting with colleagues at peer schools from around the state.
