CAPE continues to accept applications with plans to name a new Executive Director in the coming year. In a recent Gallup Poll featured in the CAPE Outlook, adults aged 18 and older were asked to rate how good an education the following school types provide: Independent, Religious, Charter, Home, and Public. Seventy-one percent rated independent schools as excellent or good while 44% rated public schools as excellent or good. Religious schools were rated next to independent schools with 63% receiving excellent or good. Charter schools ranked third with 55% of participants rating them as excellent or good. Forty-six participants in the poll rated home schooling as excellent or good. In other news, a government report released in August noted a 7% rise in private school enrollment between the years, 2013 and 2015. FCIS New Teacher Institute 2017 September 17-19

The New Teacher Institute welcomed 45 enthusiastic, new and nearly new independent school teachers at the beautiful Mission Inn, just north of Orlando. On Sunday, teachers from over 21 different FCIS schools gathered to spend almost two full days together. They participated in a wide variety of workshops designed to strengthen and enhance their teaching and learning. Topics included independent school culture and tradition, parents as partners, classroom and time management, lesson planning and assessment, differentiated learning, technology and innovation, and bringing joy into the classroom. Lori Smith, an Orlando attorney, presented a session on professionalism; how to be an asset, not a liability, to your school; social media use; and other important legal issues relating to independent schools. After spending several weeks in the classroom, new teachers were eager to reflect on their experiences so far, to ask questions, and to discuss and expand their knowledge of best practices. They also took full advantage of connecting with educators from peer schools and enjoyed learning from each other and building the foundation for professional learning networks for ongoing collegial support.

Leadership Partners through Principles of Good Governance October 1-2

On October 1-2, a group of Heads and Board Chairs met at the Hyatt Regency Orlando International Airport for the FCIS Leadership Partners through Principles of Good Governance workshop. Dr. Barbara Hodges, FCIS Executive Director, and Dr. Jan Pullen, Head of Saint Stephen's Episcopal Day School in Bradenton, teamed up to design the program and lead each of the sessions. The workshop offered strategies for strengthening the partnership, support and collaboration between Heads and Board Chairs. Topics included: The Relationship Needed for Good Leadership, Leadership and Effective Communication, Issues Facing Independent Schools Today, Strategic Planning and Board Expectations, and Effective Governance. Each topic led to many informal discussions that carried over into Sunday evening's dinner and Monday's lunch. Time was also allocated for questions, candid observations and brainstorming. A major factor in a school's success is a healthy Head-Board Chair relationship, and participants took full advantage of their time together to share goals and challenges facing their individual schools as well as the broader independent school community.
