from the executive director...

Fall has officially arrived in Florida, although the temperatures don't always seem to support that. Even with the warm temperatures, it is the time of year when our schools have settled in and are making assessments and planning initiatives for the year ahead. Just like our schools, FCIS is assessing member data and is deeply involved in programs and initiatives to support our member schools. Our aggregate enrollment is once again up, following an upward trend over the past six years. Sixty percent of our schools have increased in enrollment since 2010, and forty percent of our schools have decreased in enrollment. Our state association enrollment trend is similar to the national trend, as reported in the 2015-16 NAIS Trendbook. That trend is indicative of the progress that our FCIS schools are making as they continue to reassess and re-envision the educational programs needed to prepare our students for the future they will experience

New FCIS Standards and Evaluation Process: As reported at the November 2015 Annual Meeting, FCIS has been piloting a new evaluation process for the past two years. This new process focuses on school improvement and encourages schools to identify essential questions on which schools seek feedback from visiting teams. As we have been piloting and refining this process, the FCIS Board of Directors has simultaneously been working to revise the FCIS Standards. The new standards, which become effective July 1, 2017, were approved by the FCIS Board at their September meeting. There will be more information on these new standards at the upcoming 2016 Annual Meeting at the FCIS Convention on November 3-4 in Miami. This is an important meeting for all member schools to attend.

FCIS Annual Convention – Along with the presentation of new standards, the FCIS Convention Steering Committee has planned an outstanding program at the Hyatt Regency Orlando Miami. Special thanks go to Elise Ecoff, Head of School of North Broward Preparatory School, and Bob Goldberg, Head of School at The Benjamin School, and all of the Miami-area FCIS schools for chairing and host

ing this important event. Thursday keynote speakers include Paul Tough, Journalist, Speaker, and Author of How Children Succeed; and Dr. Amishi Jha. Director of Contemplative Neuroscience, UMindfulness Initiative, at the University of Miami. On Friday, Kristen Hadeed, Millennial Engagement Expert and Entrepreneur, will kick off the faculty day, followed by thought-provoking sessions and an inspiring luncheon keynote given by Michael Baiamonte, Voice of the Miami Heat. New this year, there will be two pre-conference offerings on November 2. Once again, ISM will provide a day-long workshop, but new to the lineup will be a pre-conference workshop presented by nationally recognized Howard Teibel, who will present on "The Changing Tide of Leadership". This convention is not to be missed.

CAPE – The **SAT** mean scores for **2016** graduates from independent schools exceeded the previously set College and Career Readiness Benchmark of 1550. The mean combined score for **independent school seniors** was **1645**, as compared to **public school seniors** with a mean combined score of **1453**. On the **2015-16 SAT National Scores**, the mean score for writing was 536 for independent schools, 525 for religious schools, and 472 for public schools. The reading mean score was 530 for independent schools, 532 for religious schools, and 487 for public schools; the math mean score was 579 for independent schools, 537 for religious schools, and 494 for public schools.

FCIS SAT SCORES 2014-15 – The mean combined score for FCIS schools was 1662, 17 points over the independent school mean. The mean score for FCIS schools in writing was 548, surpassing the national average for independent schools, as compared to 462 for the state of Florida. The reading mean score for FCIS schools was 549, again surpassing the national average for independent schools, as compared to 481 for all Florida schools. The math mean score for FCIS schools was 565, as compared to 579 nationally for independent schools, and 475 for all Florida schools.

Leadership Partners through Principles of Good Governance September 25-26

On September 25-26, a group of Heads and Board Chairs met at the Hyatt Regency Orlando International Airport for the *FCIS Leadership Partners through Principles of Good Governance* workshop. Dr. Barbara Hodges and Dr. Jan Pullen, Head of Saint Stephen's Episcopal Day School in Bradenton, teamed up to design the program and lead each of the sessions. The workshop offered strategies for strengthening the partnership, support and collaboration between Heads and Board Chairs. Topics included: *The Relationship Needed for Good Leadership, Leadership and Effective Communication, Issues Facing Independent Schools Today, Strategic Planning and Board Expectations*, and *Effective Governance*. Each topic led to many informal discussions that carried over into Sunday evening's dinner and Monday's lunch. Time was also allocated for questions, candid observations and brainstorming. A major factor in a school's success is a healthy Head-Board Chair relationship, and participants took full advantage of their time together to share goals and challenges facing their individual schools, as well as the broader independent school community.

FCIS New Teacher Institute 2016 September 18-20

The New Teacher Institute welcomed 60 enthusiastic, new and nearly new independent school teachers at the beautiful Mission Inn, just north of Orlando. On Sunday, teachers from over 20 different FCIS schools gathered to spend almost two full days together. They participated in a wide variety of workshops designed to strengthen and enhance their teaching and learning. Topics included: independent school culture and tradition, parents as partners, classroom and time management, lesson planning and assessment, differentiated learning, technology and innovation, and bringing joy into the classroom. Lori Smith, an Orlando attorney, presented a session on professionalism; how to be an asset, not a liability, to your school; and other important legal issues relating to independent schools. After spending several weeks in the classroom, new teachers were eager to reflect on their experiences so far, to ask questions, and to discuss and expand their knowledge of best practices. They also took full advantage of connecting with educators from peer schools and enjoyed learning from each other and building the foundation for professional learning networks for ongoing collegial support.
